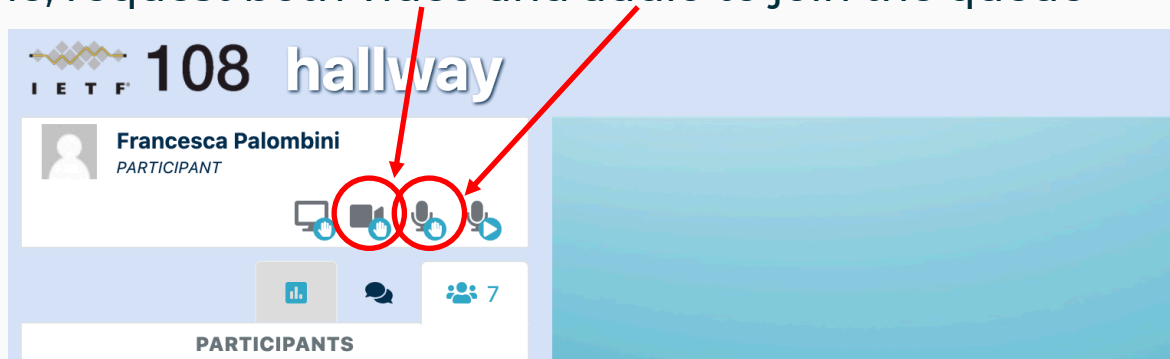
The DISPATCH Process

- Ground Rules
 - SecDispatch recommends next steps for new work
 - SecDispatch DOES NOT adopt drafts
- Possible Outcomes
 - Direct to an existing WG
 - Propose a new, focused WG
 - AD-sponsorship (assuming AD is willing)
 - Additional discussion or community development required
 - IETF should not work on this topic

Participation Guidelines
