Why Broadband Matters?


- Broadband Internet is Key:
 - For ICT based economic development .
 - Bridge the rural and urban divide.
 - Access to modern services including education, health, jobs, agriculture, etc
 - Work from anywhere
 - Home entertainment and connectivity
- A study by World Bank concluded that a 10 percentage point increase in fixed broadband penetration would increase GDP growth by 1.21% in developed economies and 1.38% in developing ones.


What is TV White Space

- Portions of the radio spectrum that are assigned to a particular use but are unused or unoccupied at specific locations and times are defined as white space (Mancuso, Probasco, & Patil, 2013)
- The study concentrated on Ultr-High Frequency, specifically that allocated for digital terrestrial television ranging from 470 694 MHz.
- In the literature, it is reported that under-utilization of spectrum resources is partly due to static spectrum allocation policy.

Quantitative Assessment of TV White Space in Tanzania

- In Tanzania, about 120 MHz is available as white space in TV band.
- Almost 82.1% of TV UHF spectrum is unused in most of the urban areas of Dodoma Region and 100% of the DTT spectrum band is not used in most of rural areas in Tanzania.

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
Community Network

- Community Network is a bottom-up approach and feasible alternative to connect the unconnected.
- It is an approach to empower the community in addressing their own local challenges related to connectivity.
- Community members are empowered to own the network and are responsible in deciding the pricing of Internet access and hence create business viability in rural area.

Community Network in Tanzania

- Connected education institutions, health facilities and community.
- The maximum bandwidth capacity: 4.70 Mbps for download and 4.75 Mbps for upload.
- Used the television white space technology
- Trained more than 123 community members
- Hosted the 4th summit on community networks in Africa


