Existing Milestones

- Develop requirements for adding confidentiality to DNS exchanges between recursive resolvers and authoritative servers (unpublished document). (Status: Abandoned)
- Investigate potential solutions for adding confidentiality to DNS exchanges involving authoritative servers (Experimental). (Status: unilateral probing draft)
- Define, collect and publish performance data measuring effectiveness of DPRIVE-published technologies against pervasive monitoring. (Maybe better suited for MAPRG?)
